The pastoral nomadic livelihood depends upon a symbiotic relationship between the nomads and farming people; the nomads supply livestock and other desert produce to villages and towns, and markets in these settlements provide the nomads with goods that cannot be produced in the desert, such as tea, sugar, flour, rice, lentils, and cloth. In addition, these market towns are indispensable as centers for the exchange of information about the environmental conditions in the desert Interior. The head of a desert family must travel to town once every six or eight weeks to obtain supplies. His principal contact in town is clan shaykh who resides there permanently. The visitor tells his headman about the status of water, pasture, and game in the region he just came from and in other areas he passed through.
