And when I say physical, I do not mean just streets and buildings themselves, but the slowing down of those processes of physical decay that streets and buildings embody. The fact that the whole of this city, too, embodies process is what the medina myth, with its implied emphasis on stasis and containment, would deny. When Aly Muborak wrote that "the history of every nation is similar to all others and this is true of every settlement without distinction between city and village." he was speaking precisely of process enunciating an insight that he shares with Ibn Khaldun.

When Aly Mubarak wrote that "the history of every nation is similar to all others and this is true of every settlement without distinction between city and village." he was speaking precisely of process enunciating an insight that he shares with Ibn Khaldun.

In attempting to fulfill this service through the preservation of streets and buildings, conservation must use initially the same materials as the historian and social scientist, the same collections of fact, the difference being that what he has in the end to offer the city is physical, not abstract. And when I say physical, I do not mean just streets and buildings themselves, but the slowing down of those processes of physical decay that streets and buildings embody. The fact that the whole of this city, too, embodies process is what the medina myth, with its implied emphasis on stasis and containment, would deny. When Aly Mubarak wrote that "the history of every nation is similar to all others and this is true of every settlement without distinction between city and village." he was speaking precisely of process enunciating an insight that he shares with Ibn Khaldun.

When Aly Mubarak wrote that "the history of every nation is similar to all others and this is true of every settlement without distinction between city and village." he was speaking precisely of process enunciating an insight that he shares with Ibn Khaldun.

And when I say physical, I do not mean just streets and buildings themselves, but the slowing down of those processes of physical decay that streets and buildings embody. The fact that the whole of this city, too, embodies process is what the medina myth, with its implied emphasis on stasis and containment, would deny. When Aly Mubarak wrote that "the history of every nation is similar to all others and this is true of every settlement without distinction between city and village." he was speaking precisely of process enunciating an insight that he shares with Ibn Khaldun.

And when I say physical, I do not mean just streets and buildings themselves, but the slowing down of those processes of physical decay that streets and buildings embody. The fact that the whole of this city, too, embodies process is what the medina myth, with its implied emphasis on stasis and containment, would deny. When Aly Muborak wrote that "the history of every nation is similar to all others and this is true of every settlement without distinction between city and village." he was speaking precisely of process enunciating an insight that he shares with Ibn Khaldun.

When Aly Mubarak wrote that "the history of every nation is similar to all others and this is true of every settlement without distinction between city and village." he was speaking precisely of process enunciating an insight that he shares with Ibn Khaldun.

The wonder of Cairo --a quality this city will have need of in times to come-- is not served by seeing it through a veil of Orientalizing myth but by looking at it logically. Rationally, and truthfully.

In attempting to fulfill this service through the preservation of streets and buildings, conservation must use initially the same materials as the historian and social scientist, the same collections of fact, the difference being that what he has in the end to offer the city is physical, not abstract. And when I say physical, I do not mean just streets and buildings themselves, but the slowing down of those processes of physical decay that streets and buildings embody. The fact that the whole of this city, too, embodies process is what the medina myth, with its implied emphasis on stasis and containment, would deny. When Aly Mubarak wrote that "the history of every nation is similar to all others and this is true of every settlement without distinction between city and village." he was speaking precisely of process enunciating an insight that he shares with Ibn Khaldun.

Migrating in search of wild game and plant food --hunting and gathering-- is humanity's oldest occupation. And when I say physical, I do not mean just streets and buildings themselves, but the slowing down of those processes of physical decay that streets and buildings embody. The fact that the whole of this city, too, embodies process is what the medina myth, with its implied emphasis on stasis and containment, would deny. When Aly Mubarak wrote that "the history of every nation is similar to all others and this is true of every settlement without distinction between city and village." he was speaking precisely of process enunciating an insight that he shares with Ibn Khaldun.

In this, Ibn Khaldoun separates thinking and action, making use of an Aristotelian point that the beginning of action is the end of thinking and vice versa.
