الباب الأول

الأهداف والأقسام والدرجات العلمية

مادة (1):

تهدف الكلية إلى تحقيق الأغراض الآتية:-

- 1) إعداد المتخصصين في الحاسبات والمعلومات المؤهلين بالأسس النظرية ومنهجيات التطبيق بما يؤهلهم للمنافسة العالمية في تطوير تكنولوجيا الحاسبات والمعلومات.
- 2) إجراء الدراسات والبحوث العلمية والتطبيقية في مجال الحاسبات والمعلومات وفي مفاستها التي لها أثر على التنمية المتكاملة في المجتمع.
- 3) تقديم الاستشارات والمساعدات العلمية والفنية للهيئات والجهات التي تستخدم تكنولوجيا الحاسبات والمعلومات وتهتم بصناعة واتخاذ القرار ودعمه.
- 4) تدريب الكوادر الفنية في قطاعات الدولة المختلفة على تكنولوجيا الحاسبات والمعلومات.
- 5) إعادة تأهيل خريجي الكليات المختلفة طبقاً لحاجة سوق العمل في المجالات الحديثة لعلوم الحاسب والمعلومات وذلك عن طريق الدراسة النظامية في الدبلومات المتخصصة.
- 6) نشر الوعي وتعميقه في المجتمع بهدف إدخال استخدام تكنولوجيا الحاسب والمعلومات في قطاعات ومؤسسات الدولة المختلفة ورفع كفاءة استخدامها.
- 7) الاشتراك مع الجهات المتخصصة لتطوير برمجيات النظم والتطبيقات وخاصة العربية منها.
- 8) تنظيم المؤتمرات وعقد الاجتماعات العلمية بهدف الارتقاء بالمستوى التعليمي وتعميق المفهوم العلمي بين الكوادر المتخصصة.
- 9) عقد الاتفاقيات مع الهيئات والمؤسسات المناظرة على المستوى المحلي والإقليمي والعالمية بهدف تبادل الآراء وإجراء البحوث المتعلقة بتخصصات الحاسبات والمعلومات.
- 10) إنشاء وحدات أبحاث متخصصة متقدمة في الفروع المختلفة لعلوم الحاسبات والمعلومات.
- 11) توفير وتدعيم وسائل النشر والبحث العلمي في شتى مجالات التخصص.

مادة (2):

تتكون الكلية من الأقسام العلمية التالية:-

(1) قسم علوم الحاسب

(2) قسم نظم المعلومات

(3) قسم تكنولوجيا المعلومات

ويجوز أن تنشأ بالكلية أقسام أخرى وفقاً لأحكام قانون تنظيم الجامعات.

مادة (3):

تمنح جامعة المنصورة بناء على طلب مجلس الكلية درجة البكالوريوس وذلك في

أحد التخصصات العلمية الآتية:-

(أ) علوم الحاسب

(ب) نظم المعلومات

(ج) تكنولوجيا المعلومات

ويجوز أن تمنح الجامعة بناء على طلب مجلس الكلية هذه الدرجة العلمية في

تخصصات أخرى وفقاً لأحكام قانون تنظيم الجامعات.

الباب الثاني الدراسة والامتحانات

مادة (4):

تقبل الكلية خريجي الثانوية العامة الذين أتموا بنجاح دراسة مواد الرياضيات كاملة في مرحلة الثانوية العامة ومادة الفيزياء.

مادة (5):

مدة الدراسة لنيل درجة البكالوريوس أربع سنوات جامعية مقسمة على ثمانية فصول دراسية بالإضافة إلى تدريب عملي. ويشترط لحصول الطالب على الدرجة الجامعية الأولى أن يجتاز بنجاح الرخصة الدولية لقيادة الحاسب الآلي ICDL أو ما يقابلها من الشهادات الأخرى واعتبارها متطلب جامعي للتخرج.

مادة (6):

يدرس الطالب في الفرقة الأولى والثانية دراسة عامة، ثم دراسة لمدة سنتين في أحد التخصصات التالية:-

أ- علوم الحاسب ب- نظم المعلومات ج- تكنولوجيا المعلومات

وتبين الجداول الملحقة بهذه اللائحة المقررات الدراسية موزعة على فصلين دراسيين لكل عام من سنوات الدراسة وعدد الساعات المخصصة أسبوعياً لكل مقرر من محاضرات ودروس عملية وتمرين. ويقر مجلس الكلية بعد أخذ رأي مجالس الأقسام المحتوى العلمي لكل مقرر دراسي.

مادة (7):

النهاية العظمى لدرجات امتحان أي مقرر مائة درجة (عدا مقرر المشروع فمئتان)، وتخصص نسبة 60% من النهاية العظمى لمجموع درجات الامتحان التحريري في المقررات العملية ونسبة 10% لامتحانات أعمال السنة التحريري ونسبة 20% للامتحانات العملية ونسبة 10% لامتحانات الشفهية. أما

بالنسبة للمقررات النظرية تخصص نسبة 75% من النهاية العظمى لمجموع درجات الامتحان التحريري ونسبة 25% للامتحانات الشفهية.

مادة (8):

يحرم الطالب من أداء الامتحان التحريري لأي مقرر أن لم يكن مستوفياً نسبة حضور لا تقل عن 75% من المحاضرات والتطبيقات العملية.

مادة (9):

ينقل الطالب من الفرقة المقيد بها إلى الفرقة التي تليها إذا نجح في جميع المقررات أو كان راسباً فيما لا يزيد عن مقرر من المقررات الأساسية لجميع السنوات الدراسية السابقة للفرقة المنقول إليها بالإضافة إلى رسوبه في مقرر ثالث من المقررات الإضافية (اختياري جامعة أو الجوانب الأخلاقية) وتعتبر المادة المتصلة مقرواً واحداً ويؤدي الطالب الامتحانات فيما رسب فيه من مقررات في موعد يحدده مجلس الكلية ويقدر نجاح الطالب في هذه المقررات بعد اجتيازها بتقدير مقبول أما إذا كانت درجاته الحاصل عليها أعلى من تقدير مقبول فيحصل على الحد الأقصى لهذا التقدير، وفي حالة تقدم الطالب بعذر مقبول فيحصل على الدرجات والتقدير الفعلي الحاصل عليه.

مادة (10):

يكلف الطلاب المنقولون إلى الفرقة النهائية بحضور فترة تدريب عملي لمدة لا تقل عن شهر ولا تزيد عن 45 يوماً في إحدى الجهات المتصلة بتخصصهم خلال العطلة الصيفية.

ويحدد مجلس الكلية أماكن التدريب ونظام توزيع الطلاب ونظام المتابعة والتقييم. ولا تمنح شهادة التخرج إلا للطلاب الذين أتموا التدريب العملي بنجاح.

مادة (11):

يكلف طلاب الفرقة النهائية بإعداد مشروع تخرج ممتد على الفصلين الدراسيين في موضوع يحدده مجلس القسم المختص، على أن يتم تقييم المشروع عملياً وشفهياً بمعرفة لجنة تشكل بناء على إقتراح مجلس القسم المختص وموافقة مجلس الكلية، ويجوز لمجلس الكلية إضافة مدة لا تزيد عن أربعة أسابيع بعد انتهاء الامتحان التحريري للفصل الدراسي الثاني لاستكمال المشروع قبل المناقشة النهائية، وعلى الطالب أن يجتاز بنجاح مشروع البكالوريوس، وفي حالة رسوبه أو غيابه يعد باقياً للإعادة ويؤدي الطالب امتحانه في الموعد الذي يحدده مجلس الكلية حسبما ورد بالمادة(9).

مادة (12):

يقدر نجاح الطالب في المواد الدراسية والتقدير العام بأحد التقديرات الآتية:-

ممتاز : من 85% فأكثر من مجموع الدرجات.

جيد جداً : من 75% إلي أقل من 85% من مجموع الدرجات.

جيد : من 65% إلي أقل من 75% من مجموع الدرجات.

مقبول : من 50% إلي أقل من 65% من مجموع الدرجات.

أما رسوب الطالب فيقدر بأحد التقديرين الآتيين :-

ضعيف : من 30% إلي أقل من 50% من مجموع الدرجات.

ضعيف جداً : أقل من 30% من مجموع الدرجات.

مادة (13):

يحسب التقدير العام للطالب في درجة البكالوريوس على أساس المجموع الكلي للدرجات التي حصل عليها في كل السنوات الدراسية ويتم ترتيبهم وفقاً لهذا المجموع، ويمنح الطالب مرتبة الشرف إذا كان تقديره التراكمي العام ممتازاً أو جيد جداً وعلى ألا يقل تقديره العام في أي فرقة من الفرق الدراسية عن جيد جداً وألا يكون قد رسب في أي امتحان تقدم له وأية فرقة من الفرق الدراسية بالكلية طبقاً لنص المادة (85) من قانون تنظيم الجامعات.

** مرتبة الشرف اعتبارية حيث يعتد في الترتيب بالمجموع التراكمي.

الباب الثالث الأحكام الانتقالية

مادة (14):

تطبق اللائحة بالتتابع ابتداءً من العام الجامعي التالي لإقرارها على جميع الطلاب المقيدين بالفرقة الأولى المستجدين والباقيين للإعادة فيها ويستمر العمل باللائحة السابقة الصادرة بالقرار الوزاري رقم 332 لعام 1996 وتعديلاتها على باقي الطلاب المقيدين بالكلية لحين انتهاء دراستهم بها .
